Meeting called to order

Introduction of staff

It was moved and seconded to accept the minutes of the last year's 10/2017 annual meeting. Introduction of members present

Board of director nominations – Holly McCoy, Literacy Services and Liz Hart, Literacy Chippewa Valley. Nominated from the floor by Cheryl Hernandez was Kay Mac Kenzie, Centro Hispano. Ballots were distributed, one per agency, voting for two slots. Results reported out in e-news.

Update from WLI 2917 - Michele Erikson

- Focusing on the TABE 11 &12 to be able to share data with funders
- Workforce Development Coordinator has been added in the Northwest (Angie Stokes)
- A focus on jail services.

Demographic Update - Liz Fitzpatrick-

- 73 members served 16,611 learners
- 3391 active tutors and total volunteer time was valued at \$8,932,648
- 922 learners completed GED or HSED
- 1,660 learners got a job, a better job or received a promotion

English Forward Training – Anna Bierer

Explained how programs become involved in future trainings. It is at no cost to members, their staff and volunteer tutors. Discussion followed.

Health Literacy—Michele Erikson

- Evolved to an organization working with other programs in other states.
- April 2 & 3 is the Health Literacy Summit, Monona Terrace, Madison. Speakers from around the country will be doing sessions. National Geographic photographer will close the program on the 3rd.
- Medication Labeling has been a statewide, seven-year project, currently in year 5 (phase 3).
 Three pilot pharmacies have been working with WHL. Just added Aurora Pharmacies. The goal is to get state pharmacies to switch over to an easier to read/understand Rx labels.
- Let's Talk About Pain Medicines is looking for new funding
- Improving Early Dementia Care is another initiative just finishing up.
- Digital Literacy and Health is just starting to help others understand how to access trust worthy websites for health information.

X Prize - Michele Erikson

Discussion of the X-Prize and a discussion of how members could be involved. WLI is interested in registering for a statewide organization. Members are encouraged to contact Michele if they are interested or want to serve on an ad hoc committee..

Agency input/discussion

Randy from WI Institutions offered to connect members to correctional facilities. There has been a drop in ELL learners when there are raids by ICE, or threats of raids, which was discussed. Solutions for helping include providing rides to learners so they don't need to drive and providing bus passes to students. Also participating in community events where agency can reach out to parents. Nancy Wheeler said they are finding there is a need to educate the community on who our learners are with the technical colleges. It's a process to find the way.
