Benefits of Involving Volunteers

- **Greater potential program reach**, flexibility, and access for learners with less financial burden for program participants and the organization
- More relevant teaching volunteers know about and have connections in the local community
- Mutual learning volunteers teach as "guides on the side" that are learning alongside their student
- **Diversity** volunteers bring diverse backgrounds, experiences, and teaching styles
- Passion, dedication, positive attitude
- Anything else?




Challenges of Involving Volunteers



- Many volunteers do not have formal training in teaching
- Limited availability / scheduling conflicts / difficulty maintaining consistency
- May require greater investment of staff time for guidance, support, and follow-up
- Other challenges?






Recruiting & Clear Expectations

Questions to Consider:

- How do your volunteers fit into the "big picture"?
- What is bringing your volunteers in?
- What are the expectations on both sides?
- What is the support provided by the organization?





What volunteer opportunities can you offer?

Flexibility in volunteer offerings can allow people to get to know your organization before making a longer-term commitment.



- 5 1-1 Tutoring
- Lead Group Teachers
- Group Teaching Assistant
- Conversation partners
- Curriculum writing
- other?

What is "Community Conversations?"

- 1. Invite **community volunteers** to practice English conversation with your students 90-minute commitment
- 2. Provide volunteers with a **30-minute training** and **tips**
- **3. Pair up** with 1-3 students to have English conversation, speed-dating style for **one hour** (15-minute rounds)
- 4. Rotate 3-4 times and then debrief at the end


- Build shared understanding and language among program administrators about who key volunteer audiences are
- Focus program design decisions
- Inspire program administers to use **empathy** to be in the "shoes" of their participants
- Reduce chances of possibly being side-tracked by assumptions

Ideal materials for volunteers:

- Make best practices in adult education (ESOL, ABE) easy to implement
- Are step-by-step
- Encourage mutual learning, shared perspectives, and cultural exchange
- Are structured and flexible at the same time
- Are versatile for in-person, groups, and online teaching



Materials [**≣**|**≡**]



Intercambio's materials for adult **ELLs** have the following qualities & features:

- A student book that is not "precious": it's approachable, looks like a workbook, and has paper that's easy to write on with pencil and erase
- A structured, predictable order of activities, covering "just right" materials for 1 lesson in a 90-minute session



Intercambio's materials for **volunteer teachers** have the following qualities & features:

- A Teacher Book with stepby-step instructions with "callouts" to guide activities



Exploring Outcomes for Students AND Volunteers



Volunteers

- Volunteers feeling prepared to teach rises from 58% to 90%
- Volunteer teachers understanding positive and negative experiences of English language learners in the U.S. rose from 15% to 85%
- 80% of volunteer teachers are regularly learning from English language learners about their cultures and perspectives
- Volunteer teachers that have talked to ELLs about racism, discrimination, or biases rises from 40% to 65%
- Volunteer teachers also report having more ELL friends
